At its Final German Wednesday Evening, June Fourth

In the Assembly Hall Nineteen hundred and two September 30, 1902 Childress, Va.

My dearest Kit,

I hope you will pardon my not writing sooner, but you know how very lazy I am about writing. I enjoyed my visit to your folks so much but I always do enjoy a visit to my "river kin."

Well our teacher has come and gone! She could not stand us poor white folks. She taught a week and said she could not teach any longer on account of ill health. She was not well while here. I am so sorry about it as I think she would have been a splendid teacher and she played beautifully.

I don't know what we are to do about a teacher: you know most of them that are any good have places now.

Laura Ingles' teaching surprised me more than anything that has happened lately. I would not have been much more surprised to hear that you or Julia were up there teaching. They all like her very much as teacher though.

Have you started to school yet and have your boarders gone? I am real mad at you for not coming to see me. Did you go to the St. Albans reception and how about Bryce...have you seen him? In saw in the Advance that "Squinty" has returned. Of course you are perfectly delighted at that. Have you and Stickney had an encounter yet?

By the way I saw Margaret Wade's beau in Christiansburg the other day and his arms were swinging just like winding blades. I looked and looked for Zachariah but did not even get a glimpse (is that the way to spell it?) of his smiling countenance.

Effie Harvey is visiting at Uncle Millard's. Will and I went over to see her and she was mighty sweet and pleasant. She will be there until after the fair.

We all spent the day with Aunt Essie Saturday. Of course she had a house full of company and lots of good things to eat. Her cook left Saturday evening and is to be married this week to a Mr. Thomas Clark that lives somewhere near you all. Aunt Essie is in a "peck of trouble" over it as she doesn't know where she can find anyone to stay with her and then she is not very well either. Cousin Elrica is still there and Miss Williamson, the public school teacher, is boarding with them also. Bess Shelburne, Mrs. Roop, is "mother" now!

Kit, write to Mr. Frank Cassell. I think you stand some chances of winning the twenty dollars. Tell Elrica to come and stay with us some 0- it will be good for her. Now Honey come to see me real soon as you get this.

I have thought about you often and tried to write and send you this card to let you know I still love you and think of you often and often I wish I could see you right now. Do write to me and tell me all about your silver. I will write you a letter as soon as I can. My love to your mother and father and all the rest, and especially yourself.

July 21, 1902 Lexington, VA

My dear Kit,

Your nice letter certainly deserved better treatment than I have given it. I wanted to write at once and tell you how much I enjoyed it but have waited to see if it could be possible for me to accept your kind invitation. The longer I wait the dimmer the prospect becomes, so I will not wait any longer for I can see now that it will not be possible for me to come home this summer. I should love to get to see you in your sweet home and have certainly enjoyed my stays with you – but will have to decline another visit until Mother gets stronger. I am not willing to have her as weak as she is and then it will confine Mary so – for we never leave her alone. I take her for a drive nearly every morning. She comes home very tired.

I have thought about you very often this spring and [more] especially before and after commencement. Tom and John often asked about you and John said he was going to send you his picture. I do not expect either one of them back next year. Nettie Smith asks for you. I rarely see any of the other girls. You remember little _____do you not? Well he went over to see Denise Shields in a very extreme way the other day and asked her to marry him. She accepted him and he is radiant. We thought we were going to have that little brother at home some this summer – his to here and that is all has left early in the month and now I do not know when he will be back. I am glad you all do not want to give him up. How are the water melons this year? We enjoyed the little glimpse of Miss Ingles in June but it was a very short glimpse we had. I hope you are all feeling well and happy. When are you coming to see me again I wish you would come this summer can't you before you start to school. I am a regular farmer you should see my garden and flowers. Do write to me soon Kittie and I will not treat you badly dear again. I have been feeling so badly all the spring that I had hardly been able to get through my regular duties – and they have been _____ and many. Have you been reading this summer? Mary is just starting ______ as pictures if there are any good ones that I think you might like we'll send _____ but I think they are mostly George (Elliott?). Julia is going to cut his curls off so want some pictures of him before the

We are all in deep distress in this part of town over losing the Smiths – think of it! They expect to move to Staunton early in the fall to live! I do not know what we will do without them. Mr. Smith goes there to teach – I wish you were here to take a drive with me this evening – It is a perfect evening. Give my love to all your dear ones and know that though I am so long distant it is not because I do not love you. I do and believe me always your true friend. Now write to me very soon. I do so much enjoy your letters – I do hope your dear mother is better.

July 29, 1902 Christiansburg

I think it is too bad that you have to be ruled by your older sister and Mama that they will not allow you to correspond with me. May I ask you the reason? I cannot tell you just when I can bring Mary and Margaret up, but will let you know a few days before hand. Christiansburg is very dull at this time. Can you not come down and help us to put a little life in the town? I think your "smiling face" would revive things very much. I will see you get back all right and let you take Mary and Margaret back with you. Will Trollinger is in town today, as it is court day. I think it is too bad that he would not take you to the dance. I would have done so with the greatest of pleasure you know, but as a rule brothers and cousins generally would rather take someone else, but, of course, I am not that way!

When are you coming up to Capt. S _____? I will bring this to a stop. Hoping to see and hear from you soon. You will have to excuse this note for I have written it and Stella Childress talking to me all the time.
